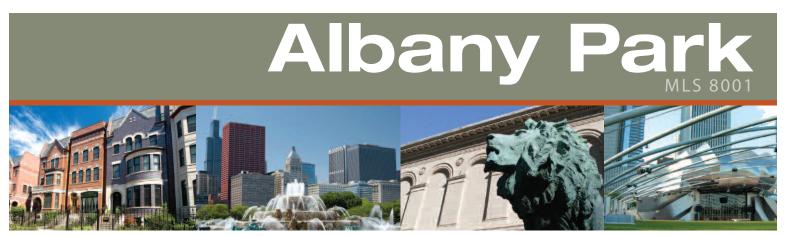

# Revitalizing Our Marketplace



#### Methodology

Because a neighborhood encompasses so much more than what its demographics and statistics reveal, a canvassing report is crucial for creating a more complete picture that also includes non-statistical information, such as the physical condition of buildings, true accessibility, public transportation options, ratio of visitors to residents and the graffiti and littering that a canvasser can witness. Through visits and photos of communities taken during peak hours, an outsider can gain a comprehensive understanding of a neighborhood that falls beyond its demographics.

After identifying Chicago community areas defined by the Multiple Listing Service and City of Chicago, C.A.R.'s Economic Development Team visited and walked one commercial corridor in each. We made note of each street-level storefront property address, its use and its condition. We also observed each community area as a whole, pertaining to its cleanliness, walkability, housing stock, traffic patterns and connectedness to other city areas. We visited some local establishments too, to assess their level of business and availability of certain services.

Following is our finding.

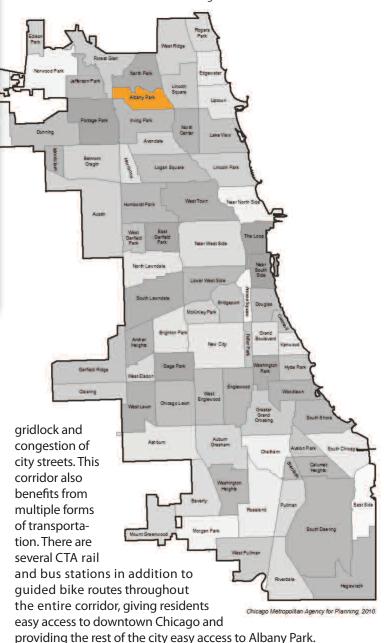
Diversity best describes the Lawrence Avenue corridor in the Albany Park community area. Beginning on Lawrence at Kedzie, there is a strong Middle Eastern presence. There are a variety of restaurants/kabob stands, shops and service-oriented businesses. Moving farther west on Lawrence, the area becomes largely Hispanic, with similar amenities as in the Middle Eastern portion of the corridor. The streets have an amazing urban vibrancy, with large numbers of street venders selling everything from popsicles to enchiladas. The corridor also contains a variety of grocery stores where residents can purchase fresh produce.

Because of its densely populated blend of cultures, Albany Park is a unique neighborhood in Chicago. Another sidewalk issue is lack of bike racks. There are but a few scattered around this corridor (not including at the CTA station), leaving riders no safe place to secure their bicycles.

Despite vacancies evident along this corridor, the vast majority of storefronts and parcels are filled with small, local businesses. The stability of this corridor is very strong, boasting many local businesses and very few chains. This corridor has a good balance of streetscapes and businesses with private lots,

One problem for this corridor is lack of public space on busy Lawrence Avenue. This, coupled with the lack of outdoor dining options, leaves little space for visitors or residents to commune. Lastly, the housing stock seems strong, given the good condition of residential side streets off Lawrence Avenue.

Although the community does not have glaring issues, its attractiveness to younger, upper class residents could become a problem.

Even though neighborhood gentrification can have many positive effects, it can also push out families that cannot afford to pay the community's increasing costs. Albany Park needs to take precautions to ensure that gentrification does not erode the characteristics that make it such a great place.

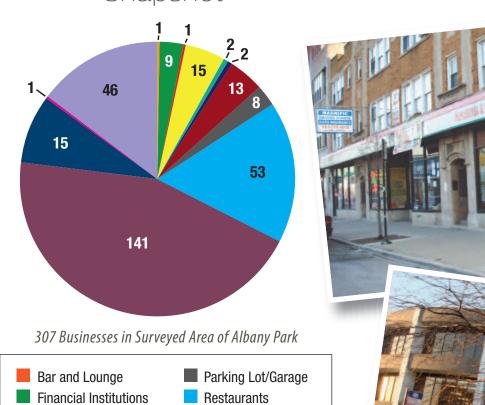
